What is a Pilgrimage?

A pilgrimage is a journey or search of moral or spiritual significance. It is a journey to a shrine or other location of importance to a person's beliefs and faith although sometimes it can be a metaphorical journey into someone's own beliefs.

Where we'll visit:

Memorial for Peace and Justice–The nation's first memorial dedicated to the legacy of enslaved black people, people terrorized by lynching. African Americans humiliated by racial segregation and Jim Crow.

Where we'll visit:

Southern Poverty Law Center–The Southern Poverty Law Center is dedicated to fighting hate and bigotry and to seeking justice for the most vulnerable members of our society.

Civil Rights Memorial Center–The Civil Rights Memorial Center is a memorial to forty-one people who were killed in the struggle for the equal and integrated treatment of all people.

Rosa Parks Museum–The Rosa Parks Museum is an active memorial to the life of civil rights icon Rosa Parks and the lessons of the Montgomery Bus Boycott that brought racial integration to transportation and international attention to civil rights.

Edmund Pettus Bridge–The site of the conflict of Bloody Sunday, on March 7, 1965 when armed police attacked and brutally beat Civil Rights Movement demonstrators.

Legacy Museum–A museum that displays the history of slavery and racism in America which includes the enslavement of African Americans, racial lynchings, segregation and racial bias.



Where we'll visit:

Tuskegee Airmen National Historic Site–Commemorates the contributions of African American airmen in World War II.

Tuskegee Human & Civil Rights Multicultural Center–Tuskegee's cultural history of Native American, European American and African American triumphs and tragedies.

Lowndes Interpretive Center–Dedicated to those who peacefully marched fifty-four miles from Selma to the state's capitol in Montgomery in order to gain the right to vote.

Voting Rights Museum–Located in the Historic District of Selma, Alabama at the foot of the Edmund Pettus Bridge, the scene of “Bloody Sunday,” the National Voting Rights Museum & Institute is the cornerstone of the contemporary struggle for voting rights and human dignity.

We will prepare ourselves for our pilgrimage to Alabama by gathering with the Ministers (Dates TBD). We will also have a post-pilgrimage gathering to share our experiences as a group.

REFLECTION

In order to reflect upon the spiritual significance of each day's activities, our group will have an opportunity to process in a reserved space at the Drury Inns and Suites.
